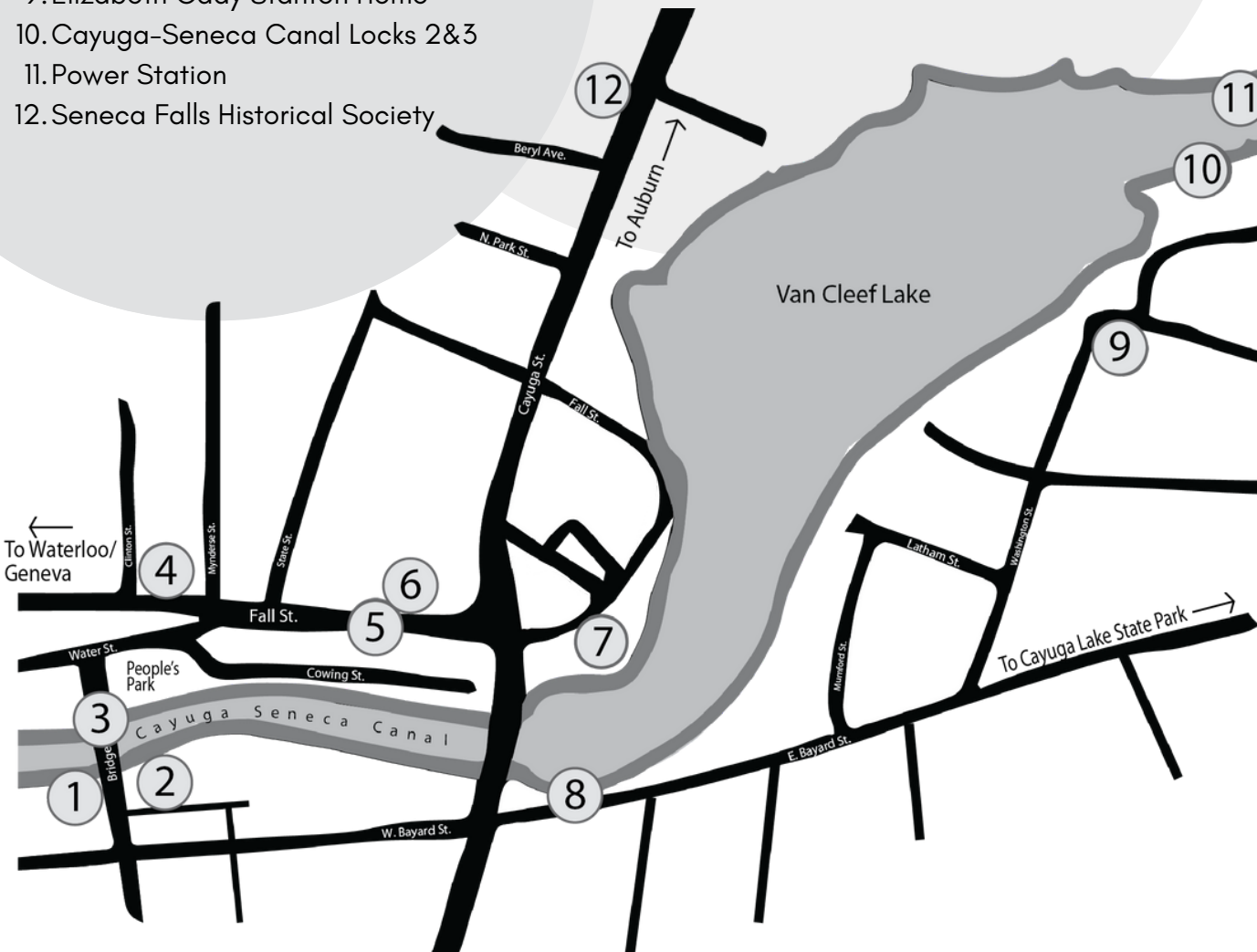

# MUSEUM TRAIL

## 1. LUDOVICO SCULPTURE TRAIL

The 0.9 mile Ludovico Sculpture Trail located along the Cayuga-Seneca Canal is named after Frank J Ludovico. The trail features different sculptures along the trail as well as benches from which to enjoy the scenery.

## 2. NATIONAL WOMEN'S HALL OF FAME

The National Women's Hall of Fame honors great American women and their contributions to the arts, athletics, business, education, government, humanities, philanthropy, and science. "Showcasing great women...inspiring all."

## 3. ITS A WONDERFUL LIFE BRIDGE

This bridge claims to be the inspiration for the bridge that George Bailey contemplated his suicide on in *Its A Wonderful Life*. On April 12, 1917, Antonio Varacalli drowned while successfully rescuing a young woman from the Cayuga-Seneca Canal, a young woman who was trying to commit suicide.

## 4. Women's Rights National Historical Park

Women's Rights National Historical Park tells the story of the first Women's Rights Convention held in Seneca Falls on July 19-20, 1848. It is a story of the struggles for civil rights, human rights, and equality. It's a global struggle that continues today. The efforts of women's rights leaders, abolitionists, and other 19th century reformers remind us that all people must be accepted as equals.

## 5. SENECA FALLS HERITAGE & TOURISM CENTER

The Seneca Falls Heritage and Tourism Center is home of the Seneca Museum of Waterways and Industry and serves as an orientation point for tourists. Learn how the waterways shaped the spread of ideas and led to the growth of various industries in Seneca Falls.

## 6. It's a Wonderful Life Museum

The Seneca Falls It's a Wonderful Life Museum was opened on December 10, 2010. The Museum hosts more than 30 exhibits that focus on many different aspects of It's a Wonderful Life and those associated with it. Visit its temporary location while their main building undergoes renovations.

## 7. TRINITY EPISCOPAL CHURCH

The cornerstone for this church was laid on June 2, 1855 and it was completed in 1856. Situated on beautiful Van Cleef Lake, this is one of the most photographed churches in New York State.

## 8. WHEN ANTHONY MET STANTON STATUE & RIPPLES OF CHANGE STATUES

The **When Anthony Met Stanton** depicts a moment in 1851 when abolitionist Elizabeth Cady Stanton (right), came upon her friend Amelia Bloomer (center) and one of Bloomer's friends, Susan B. Anthony (left). Their friendship would spark a nationwide women's voting-rights movement.

The **Ripples of Change** Statues depict four activists whose work spanned generations: Laura Cornelius Kellogg, Harriet Tubman, Martha Coffin Wright, and Sojourner Truth

## 9. ELIZABETH CADY STANTON HOME

The home of Elizabeth Cady Stanton. She was the main organizer of the Seneca Falls' Woman's Right Convention and primary author of the Declaration of Sentiments.

This site is managed by the Women's Rights National Historical Park.

## 10. CAYUGA-SENECA CANAL LOCKS 2 & 3

**9 Seneca St • 315-568-5797**

Upgraded as part of the New York State Barge Canal System that was completed in 1918, these two locks carry boats up and down a combined elevation of 49 ft. Stop by for scenic views of Van Cleef Lake and watch boats pass through the canal locks.

## 11. POWER STATION

The Seneca Power Corporation was formed in 1915 to build and operate a hydro-electric generating plant on Van Cleef Lake.

## 12. Seneca Falls Historical Society

Founded in 1896, the Seneca Falls Historical Society is an invaluable resource for local and regional history, life, and culture. Their extraordinary collections tell the story of Seneca Falls through thousands of rare documents, archival records, and artifacts.
